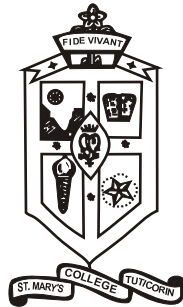

FOUNDATION AND ROOTS OF THE COLLEGE

The Congregation of Mother of Sorrows, Servants of Mary (Servite Sisters) is an indigenous Women's Congregation founded in 1854 at Tiruchirappalli, TamilNadu, numbering around 1000 sisters working in 150 communities spread in North and South India, Myanmar, Italy, Philippines and Australia. The Servites render their service in schools, colleges, social service centres, hospitals, dispensaries, schools for visually challenged and hearing impaired and Mission Stations.

St.Mary's College, a Catholic Institution of Higher Education for Women, run by the Servite Sisters was founded in 1948, by the joint efforts of Msgr. Francis Tiburtius Roche SJ (Bishop of Thoothukudi), Fr. B.S. Soosainathar (Former Manager of the College) and the Servite Superiors for Higher Education, especially for the marginalized women of the coastal region. It enjoys a rich academic and spiritual heritage as a Christian minority institution for the past seven decades. The institution has made its mark in empowering women in their march towards excellence and liberation, right from its inception.

Affiliated to Manonmaniam Sundaranar University, the college offers Graduate, Post Graduate, M.Phil. and Ph.D. programmes. Besides academics, the college aims at the integral development of students, especially in Spiritual, Social and Civic values.

The college became autonomous in 2009. Satisfied with the successful performance of the college, the Autonomy Renewal Committee renewed and extended the status upto 2021.

Choice Based Credit System

The college has implemented Choice Based Credit System for the students admitted in UG and PG courses from 2009 onwards. It is applicable to all the courses under the Regular and Self Supporting sections. The word ‘credit’ suggests that learning can be measured and given a credit value i.e., one credit means specified hours of learning with the instructor. Assessment Criteria for Examination

Assessment is based on Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and End Semester Examination (ESE) with equal weightage of 50% each for II and III year UG students. For I year UG and all PG students the ratio of CIA and ESE is 40:60. CIA and ESE assessments are mandatory for a student to complete a course.

1. CIA includes three compulsory tests for each semester including online quiz with other components such as, assignment and seminar. The average of the best two tests will be taken as test mark.
2. Passing minimum for U.G. is 40% . For P.G. and M.Phil, it is 50% for both in CIA and ESE.
3. ESE shall be conducted twice a year in the month of November and April.

A statement of marks for every semester examination will be provided to the students. At the end of the programme, a consolidated statement of marks of the entire programme based on the credit point system will be provided to the student.

The examination results will be published within 21 days of the last examination. Retotalling, revaluation and supplementary exams are permissible as per rules framed for U.G., P.G. and M.Phil. Courses.

Continuous Internal Assessment

1. Attendance is mandatory.
2. Minimum pass is mandatory.
 - U.G. - 40%
 - P.G. - 50%
 - M.Phil - 50%
3. A student can become eligible to appear for ESE only on completion of CIA.
4. Adequate preparation is necessary for CIA as well as ESE.

CO- CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities of the college support and complement the academic programme. They provide opportunities to create a rapport with the society and also serve as appropriate platforms for the students to exhibit their talents and potential. All the UG students are expected to involve in any one of the co-curricular activities during the first two years of their study. The student earns one credit for the activity.

NSS

There are four N.S.S. units with 100 students in each unit. Through this scheme, the students get an exposure to the stark realities of societal life and are made to realise their responsibilities towards the society. They have annual camps during which their service among the people in the rural area educates them and benefits the society.

NCC

The NCC wing functions to instil in the young minds discipline and a happy sense of belonging to our country. They train themselves to take up the 'B' and 'C' Certificate examinations and get sometimes the honour to be in the Republic Day parade. By attending various camps held at Inter-State level, the students get a wide exposure and gain a healthy expansion of their horizon and contacts.

SPORTS & GAMES

Our college gives importance to sports and games. Our teams have always excelled in athletics and various games. We have secured and retained MS University Women's Zone overall shield several times and consequently the Championship title. Our students participate in inter-collegiate tournaments in the University, District and State levels. The candidates with distinctions in various games and athletics are given special consideration during admissions. A Gymnasium has been set up for the benefit of students and staff.

EXTRA - CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

The College offers various art forms to its young women enabling them to compete in the global sphere of education and employment. The varied skills foster an all round personality development. The awareness programmes regulate the students with the moral code of conduct, in accordance with their belief system and vision of life.

Extension Programme : CDP - TOUCH

In order to promote an integrated education among the students, Community Development Programme (CDP) has been included as part of curriculum and is named as TOUCH (Towards Upliftment and Community Healing). It is mandatory for all the II UG students to participate in this extension programme. They visit the adopted neighbouring villages to get in touch with the women and children in the area and to resolve their socio-economic issues. They organise awareness programmes, medical camps and celebrations thus promoting an egalitarian society in the neighbourhood.

Alumnae Association

Every student of the college, on completion of the course, becomes a member of the Alumnae Association. She can enroll herself either as an annual member or obtain life membership. A continual association is very much encouraged to build up a longstanding rapport with the Alma Mater.

Christian Doctrine and Ethics

One of the age old traditions of the college is to promote spiritual formation and to inculcate values among students. The Catholic students attend an hour of Christian Doctrine classes once a week, whereas the non-Catholics attend Ethics classes during the same hour.

Parent-Staff-Student Meeting

In the interest of the student welfare, the Parent-Staff-Student meeting is held every year. It is an occasion where the academic performance of students are notified, their needs and problems are discussed and necessary remedial actions are taken.

Request to Parents / Guardians

Parents / Guardians are requested to extend full co-operation to the authorities with regard to the character, discipline and academic progress of their daughter/ward. They must respond to all communications sent to them from the college pertaining to their daughter/ ward.

- Prepare for Continuous Internal Assessments and End Semester Examinations.
- Give feedback for system improvement.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

TERM DAYS

The academic year consists of two semesters. The number of days per semester as prescribed is 90 class days spread over 15 weeks per semester.

CLASS HOURS

- Classes are from 8.30 a.m. to 1.30 p.m. with a break for twenty minutes from 11.20 a.m. to 11.40 a.m.
- The classes function on a six day-order scheme with five periods and the sixth day alone with six periods.
- Students have to be in the campus before 8.20 a.m.
- The first bell goes at 8.25 a.m. for daily prayer and announcements.
- Students are expected to be attentive in class and maintain silence during devotion.

ATTENDANCE

- Promptness and regularity are the sure steps to success. The college insists upon a regular attendance.
- Students should fulfil the minimum requirement of attendance as fixed by the university to be eligible for their semester examinations and scholarship.
- Attendance at general assemblies, college programmes or functions, is compulsory.
- The lecturer-in-charge takes attendance at the beginning of each class.
- No student will be permitted to attend class, if late by ten minutes.
- If late, permission is to be obtained from the Vice-Principal or the person authorized for the purpose.
- A student absenting from class without permission will suffer loss of attendance for the full day.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE

- Leave application must be sent in the prescribed form available in the college depot.
- It must be duly signed by the parent/guardian or hostel warden for the hostel students.
- In case of illness, the absentee is required to submit the medical certificate.
- Continued absence without due reason and leave will render the student liable for suspension or deletion of the name from the roll.

CONDUCT

Every student of the college becomes part of the 'Marian' family. As a 'Marian' she is entrusted with the responsibility of upholding the values of womanhood by her good nature, behaviour and decorum. A Marian must:

- endeavour to create an atmosphere of friendly and cordial relationships.
- respect superiors and seniors and be polite and courteous to all.
- be neatly and modestly dressed in saree, half saree or churidhar.
- keep the classrooms and college premises clean and belongings neat and tidy.
- regard the college property as one's own and handle them properly.
- read notices placed on the notice boards. Ignorance of information will not be accepted as an excuse for failing to comply with it.

Restrictions and Limitations

- Day students are not allowed to enter college hostel quarters.
- Participation in fashion shows / modelling outside the college is not permitted.
- Prior permission from the Principal is required for orations or public talks outside the college.
- Usage of unrelated books, magazines, reading materials and mobile phones is prohibited and punishable.
- Students should not encourage unwanted communications or intimations. Letters addressed to students in the college are subject to scrutiny.
- Collections or subscriptions of any kind without knowledge or consent of the Principal are strictly banned.
- Students should not indulge in activities leading to the disruption of peace and discipline in the college.

FEE REGULATIONS

The academic year functions in 2 semesters, the first from June to mid-November and the second from December to mid-April. Fees must be remitted within 10 working days from the date of reopening. If the fees still remain unpaid, the names of such students will be removed from the roll.

Fee Concessions and Scholarships for students

The Management and the Government, both the State and the Central, render financial assistance to students to pursue their study based on prescribed eligibility norms. The scholarships can be availed through prescribed application forms duly filled in and submitted to the office (where these forms are issued on request). These application forms should be submitted only after enrollment in the college. Scholarship and Fee concession holders must secure 90% attendance, failing which they run the risk of losing these scholarships and concessions. Students may enquire in the office about fee concession, free education and other scholarships.

The Management gives fee concession to deserving and poor students who do not receive scholarships or concessions of any kind.

Library Rules:

1. Strict Silence should be observed in the library.

EVALUATION PROCEDURES - RULES AND REGULATIONS

Assessment Rules

1.0. Assessment Ratio

Theory Ratio

Assessment for each course has two components:

Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and End Semester Examinations (ESE). These two put together ensure an objective assessment throughout the course of study and cumulatively as well.

The ratio of CIA and ESE is

40 : 60 for I UG and all PG courses.

50:50 for II and III UG courses.

Practical Ratio

For practical the ratio is

40:60 for I UG and all PG courses

50:50 for II UG and III UG courses. The components for internal evaluation are as follows.

1. Involvement in doing the experiments	20	25
2. Record	5	5
3. Attendance	5	5
4. Model exam	10	15
Total	40	50

*A candidate can take her ESE practicals only if she has submitted her practical record.

Both CIA and ESE are mandatory to complete a course successfully.

All CIA tests will be held in the afternoon.

2.0.Assessment Rules for UG

2.1.Evaluation Pattern I UG (w.e.f. 2018-2019)

Tamil /French / General English /All Core/Core Integral / Core Skill Based / Allied (Science)

CIA : ESE ratio = 40 : 60

Components of CIA:

(i) Internal Test (Average of best two tests)	= 30 Marks
(ii) On-line quiz / quiz (Average of best two quizzes)	= 5 Marks
(iii) Assignment	= 5 Marks

Three centralized internal tests will be held for a duration of one and a half hours for 50 marks each. Average of the best two test marks will be converted to 30. - No retest will be conducted for CIA.
- Only those candidates who represent the institution or the university or the state or the nation at the time of CIA are eligible for retests and they should apply for the same through a requisition letter duly signed by head of the department and course teacher.
- All requests for retest must be accompanied by valid supporting documents.

Answer Scripts

- The CIA answer scripts shall be returned to the students within 10 days of the test date. The students must scrutinize the scripts, sign and return them to the teacher concerned.
- Any discrepancy in the marks should be brought to the notice of the respective teacher immediately.
- It is mandatory that the students sign in the consolidated internal mark record sheet before the submission of the same. Requests for correction in CIA marks after the date of signing will not be entertained.

5.0. Eligibility for ESE

Common Rules

- A student must have completed all the requirements of the CIA to appear for the End Semester Examinations.
- A student is eligible to appear for the ESE in a subject only if she has secured 75% attendance. However condonation of absence till 60% may be granted by the Principal on medical grounds.
- If the attendance is below 60%, the student has to repeat the semester.
- A student should have paid all the fees payable to the college and to the hostel if she is a hosteller.

6.0. Examination Fee

- Students must apply in the prescribed form for appearing for the ESE. Examination fee will be collected for all the courses for every semester. Students are expected to pay the prescribed End Semester Examination fee and fill the examination forms within the stipulated date.
- Applications will be received with a late fee upto 5 days after the specified date.

7.0. Valuation

- There is single valuation for UG and double valuation for PG and M.Phil. The ESE papers are valued by external examiners only.
- In double valuation the average of the two valuations will be the final result.
- In case of a difference of 10% of marks or above between the first valuation and the second valuation, there will be a third valuation. The marks secured in the third valuation will be final.

8.0 Result Publication

- The results will be scrutinized by the Awards Committee and published within 21 days of the last exam.

9.0 Statement of Marks

- Students will be given a statement of marks for each semester.
- A consolidated statement of marks will be given at the end of the programme of study.
- On receiving the mark statement, the student should ensure that entries (spellings of name, initials, register number, CIA marks, course title and code) are entered correctly. Any discrepancy should be reported to the Controller of Examinations within 4 days from the date of receiving the statement.
- Statement of marks for the semesters I,II,III,IV and V will be distributed to the parents on a notified date within three weeks from the publication of results.
- If a student loses her original statement of marks, she can apply for a duplicate mark statement by paying a prescribed fee.
- A duplicate mark statement will be issued after the usual process of police verification and submission of FIR copy.

10.0. Arrears

- A student of any course who has arrears can appear for her arrear papers in any semester. However she can appear for a maximum of 6 arrear papers only in one semester.
- The time limit for successfully completing a course is as follows:

UG	-	6 years
PG	-	4 years
M.Phil	-	2 years

11.0. Revaluation

- Revaluation of answer scripts is possible only for UG on payment of a prescribed fee. Application for revaluation must be made within 10 days from the date of publication of results.

12.0. Retotalling

- Retotalling of the marks is possible on payment of a prescribed fee for all the courses. Application for retotalling must be made within 7 days from the date of publication of results.
- There is no provision for retotalling or revaluation of practical papers for any of the courses.

13.0. Supplementary Examination

- Supplementary exams will be held for all courses after VI Semester ESE for UG, after IV Semester ESE for PG and II Semester ESE for M.Phil.
- The students who have **only one arrear paper** are eligible for the supplementary exams.
- Supplementary exams will be conducted within 21 days from the date of publication of results.
- Applications for supplementary exams should be submitted within 10 days from the date of publication of results.

14.0. Special Examination

Special exams will be held for every semester after the completion of the regular ESE. Only those students who represent the institution or the university or the state or the nation in a competition or a meet at the time of the ESE are eligible to appear for special exams

15.0. Grievance Redressal

To ensure transparency and objectivity in the evaluation process, a grievance redressal cell has been constituted.

If a student has grievances related to the CIA (theory and practical), she may approach the respective teacher and the head of the department within 3 days from the announcement of the marks. The head of the department, in turn, will refer the matter to the grievance redressal cell. The decision of the redressal cell shall be final.

16.0. Malpractice

- Malpractice in any form is strictly forbidden and will be severely dealt with.
- Possession of study materials or mobile phones in the exam halls and attempts to indulge in malpractice will also be viewed as malpractice.
- All cases of malpractice will be referred to a discipline committee constituted for this purpose. The decision of the committee shall be final.
- The above rules are applicable for both CIA and ESE. All the students who indulge in malpractice are barred from appearing for all the papers for one year.

18.0. Awarding of Ranks

- Students who have arrears and clear them subsequently will not be considered for ranks.
- Ranks will be decided based on the marks secured in core and core elective papers.

19.0. Special Rules for M.Phil

- A consolidated statement of marks will be issued after successful completion of viva voce.
- If submission of dissertation is delayed, an extension fee for submission of dissertation should be paid for every additional 3 months taken by the student after the stipulated time for submission.
- A student will be allowed only 2 such extensions.
- The dissertation can be submitted for evaluation only after passing all the theory papers.
- The theory papers and the dissertation must be completed within 2 years.

20.0. Discipline to be maintained inside the Examination Hall

1. Duplicate hall ticket will not be issued in the students' office without the permission of the Principal. In addition, hostel students should get the approval from the Warden. The penalty should be paid to receive the duplicate hall ticket if the student has lost the hall ticket.
2. Students are advised not to wear/bring gold ornaments.
3. Management is not responsible for the money/valuable things kept in the bags outside the examination hall.
4. Students are not allowed to enter/exit through all the doorways unless otherwise it is indicated as Entrance/Exit.
5. A student entering the examination hall must possess hall-ticket and identity card issued by the Principal; else she will be denied permission to write the examination. Students are permitted to carry only the writing materials.
6. Students have to occupy their allotted seats 15 minutes before the commencement of examination and maintain discipline and silence inside the examination hall. They should stand for the prayer song as well as for prayer. All should recite the Lord's Prayer aloud after the prayer song.
7. Students have to pay due attention to the instructions given by the staff before the commencement and also during the examination. Students have to fill the front page with legible handwriting before getting signature from the invigilator. Forenoon and Afternoon have to be specified as FN/AN accordingly.

8. Students must verify and satisfy themselves that they have received correct question papers with proper subject code before they start answering questions. Irrelevant question paper should be returned to the staff at once.
9. Students should not write their Register number anywhere else (except in the specified space) on the first page of the Answer Book (Main/Additional). Writing the name or making any appeal to the examiner or writing the internal assessment marks or writing the register number in the additional sheets or any other identifiable marking will be treated as an attempt to influence the examiner. Hence, any such act will attract disciplinary proceedings.
10. Students should write a minimum of 20 lines per page in the answer script issued during examinations. If found careless in usage of paper, considering space required for diagrams/charts/illustrations etc., the amount equivalent to the examination fee of that paper will be collected as fine before the issue of mark sheets.
11. Objective type questions in Section A should be answered in the first page/OMR Sheet.
12. The counting of page excludes the front main sheet containing details and instructions. Page numbers should be written at the centre of the top of the paper. Writing page numbers in the left corner should be eradicated to differentiate it from the question number.
13. Students will not be allowed to borrow writing materials, geometrical instruments, calculators etc. from others.
14. Students are prohibited from carrying cell phone inside the examination hall and also not allowed to carry purse, any textual material, printed or written or bits of papers.

15. Students should use only blue or black ink pen while answering their papers. Only for drawing diagrams or chart, colour pens/sketch pens are allowed.
16. Clark's mathematical table, Statistical table and Graph sheet will be supplied to students on request and the same should be returned immediately after use, without any scribbling. Students are permitted to use only non-programmable calculators.
17. Rough work, if any, must be done by the students on the bottom of page itself. Students can reserve, if necessary, one fourth of the page at the bottom exclusively for the purpose. No separate answer book for rough work will be supplied to students. Rough work carried out by a student will become part and parcel of the answer script. Rough work/marking questions should not be done in the question paper.
18. Students are forbidden from asking questions or clarifications of any kind from the staff during the examination.
19. Students should not detach any sheet from the main answer book or smuggle out additional sheet or main book.
20. The students who indulge in any malpractice while writing examination will be immediately referred to the Chief Superintendent for the initiation of appropriate disciplinary proceedings. If they are proved guilty of malpractice, the Examination Disciplinary Action Committee is empowered to impose punishment including fine, cancellation of papers, debarring from writing examinations for the next 2 - 5 years according to the cognizance (seriousness) of the malpractice.
21. Students are expected to stand for additional sheets earlier and to behave politely with the staff.

22. Students are not allowed to write beyond the time prescribed for the examinations.
23. Students should hand over the answer books personally to the staff, before leaving the examination hall.
24. Students must leave the exam hall column wise, silently, as guided by the invigilators.
25. In the event of public holiday being declared after the publication of timetable, the examinations will not be postponed or cancelled. The examinations will be conducted as scheduled, unless otherwise notified by the Principal.
26. Re-examinations will not be conducted if a student fails to notify the correct date/session/subject title/subject code.
27. Private students should receive the hall ticket in the office of the controller of examination. Getting hall ticket on the exam date is strictly forbidden.
28. Hall tickets will be issued to the regular candidates by the heads of departments/online. Any discrepancies should be clarified immediately with the controller of examinations.
