Studying literature at St. Mary's is a welcome choice for the students as it nurtures in them the development of sophisticated reading skills, of an ability to place literary texts in their wider intellectual and historical contexts, the expansion of comprehensive knowledge of literary forms and techniques, the aptitude of evaluating various approaches to literary criticism and theory, and to study the development of the English language in its broader context.

Echoes of the Conference:

Ever since the introduction of literary theories in the early twentieth century, there has been a paradigm shift in the interpretation of literary texts. Avant-garde modes of theoretical approaches focus on the dichotomy between the conventional form and the experimental form. Edward Said's contrapuntal reading of Jane Austen's Mansfield Park, Rene Wellek and Austin Warren's intrinsic and extrinsic approaches of literary criticism, Ulrich Weisstein's views on Comparative Literature, Stuart Hall's study of cultural identity and diaspora, Cheryll Glotfelty's fusion of environment and literature, and Simone de Beauvoir's insistence on the need to move from "immanence" to "trancendance" are some of the critical approaches which facilitate progressive interpretations of texts.

Innovation is the heart of avant-garde mode. As Literary theories form the basis for critical approaches for extracting multiple layers of meaning from the literary texts, students of literature and researchers depend on any one of the literary theories to foreground their hypotheses.

The study of literary theories enhances the cognitive domain of the scholars and the research guides and assists them in forming the avant-garde interpretations of the varied and diverse
